Ready, Steady, Grow!

At our recent Vision Weekend we were introduced to the four areas we aim to be focusing on as a church in 2017: Prayer, Encouragement, Adventure and Growth.

Each of these has been assigned an emoji or pictograph, something visual to help us remember them. The one for “growth” is a little plant with two leaves on it. That particular image immediately makes me think of what plants need in order to grow. It’s a while since I studied Biology at school, but the ones that instantly come to mind are light, water and nutrients. Just

as these are essential for natural growth, so they can point us towards what is essential for our spiritual growth.

Light

In 2 Corinthians 4.4 the Apostle Paul refers to “the light of the gospel that displays the glory of Christ”. That’s the light that helps us grow as Christians – the glory of Christ. That’s what we need to see more and more. And this doesn’t happen automatically, He must reveal His glory to us. We see this clearly when Jesus changed water into wine at that wedding in Cana. “He thus revealed His glory and His disciples put their faith in Him” (John 2.11).

As we seek to grow this year let’s pray “Lord, show me Your glory!”

In the Old Testament Moses cried out to the Lord “Show me Your glory!” As we seek to grow this



year let's make that our prayer also. It's a prayer God loves to answer.

Are found for your growth in His excellent Word!

Water

In John 7.37 Jesus declares, "Whoever believes in me, as Scripture has said, rivers of living water will flow from within them." Just in case there is any doubt as to what Jesus means by this statement John then helpfully adds the comment, "By this He meant the Spirit whom those who believed in Him were later to receive."

For us to grow spiritually we need the regular irrigation of the Holy Spirit in our lives. Again, this doesn't just happen. We need to ask and keep on asking. "If you then, though you are evil know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him." (Luke 11.13)

Nutrients

To paraphrase a famous old hymn:
What plentiful nutrients, you saints of the Lord

How gracious and wise is our God in giving us the Bible, carefully ensuring that all He wants us to know about Him was faithfully recorded and transmitted to us, despite it being written so long ago. Research students at Leeds University are offered outstanding facilities to do their research and are making major contributions to the study of climate change.

Church Meeting

At the whole church meeting Katharine Widdowson presented the proposed budget for the year. The proposed expenditure for the year is £100,000 more than the church spent in 2016. A larger proportion of the budget has been set aside for necessary improvements to the boilers and heating systems at the Headingley buildings. The deacons will be getting quotes on the likely cost of these works very soon. We have also budgeted for 5 months of a Senior Minister.

The donations budget represents 12% of what the church spends, including nearly £18,000 each to the Baptist Union's Home Mission Fund

and BMS World Mission. But many donations are unchanged from previous years, meaning that their value is eroded in real terms. The church meeting approved the budget.

Church Secretary Charles Fletcher presented some items from the Elders' Meeting, and we discussed arrangements to cover Lawrence's role now he has left the Ministry Team. A member of the Ministry Team will attend Connect Mission Community Leadership meetings and there is still a need for children's workers at Connect (and at other Mission Communities). The church agreed to extend Geoff King's role as full-time pastor to the end of 2017.

Coming Soon

Interview with Peter Morden

In the Autumn, the church invited Peter Morden to be the new Senior Minister/Team Leader at South Parade. His current commitments at Spurgeon's College mean he will be moving to Leeds and joining us later in the year. But he was around for Vision Weekend in January, when *Intouch* caught up with him.

Intouch: You're not due to start at South Parade till the summer. Why are you here today?

PM: I'm keen to come up on a regular basis to meet some people and do some ministry, so that when I do arrive hopefully I have the ability to hit the ground running and have some awareness of the church and sense where God might be leading us in future.

What are your early impressions of South Parade?

Fantastic! Really, really good. I like the structure, I like the challenge of making sense of the complexity and helping it to work well. I'm really excited by many of the things that I've seen. There are some challenges as there always are as you think about the fresh chapter in the life of something, but I'm very excited: that's my overall thought.

life of the church. What we're thinking about with prayer, adventure, encouragement and growth - these are themes that people can reflect on and work out in their own lives and think about in terms of the life of their congregations and the whole church.

What's your involvement going to be for the next six months?

We're aiming to come up in February as a family to look around Leeds, and I won't do too much in terms of church stuff then. But I'm hoping to come in March as well and spend some time with Connect. And I'm keen to come at Easter too - that's about as far as we've planned.

The Governors at Spurgeon's College have very kindly given me two days a month where I can work for South Parade and that's helping me to take this time to visit.

How can we pray for you?

Pray that I would finish well at Spurgeon's College, that's something that's really on my heart. It's a time of transition for the College, and a number of new appointments will need to be made. Pray that Spurgeon's has a good few months and that I really play my part to the full in that. I'm also currently chairing the leaders' meetings at our church in Streatham and would appreciate prayer for this too.

Malee: the Little Miracle

A young girl born with severe medical conditions had her life completely transformed through the help of BMS World Mission's Hope Home in Thailand.

Malee* had a difficult start in the world. The list of medical conditions that she was born with was long: multiple organ damage, slow brain development, heart and liver problems and slow growth.

These medical challenges were especially tough for Malee's 15-year-old mum, who couldn't afford to get her daughter the medications she needed. The ongoing struggle led Malee's mum to make the difficult decision to turn her little girl over to the state in Thailand, hoping to give her a better life.

The social welfare department in Thailand wanted to get Malee into Hope Home – a care home for children with severe disabilities, founded by a BMS mission worker.

Fortunately, there was an opening for Malee.

Children at Hope Home are being shown God's love and given the care that they need

When 18-month-old Malee arrived, carers quickly got her treatment and the medications that she so desperately needed. The great thing about Malee's condition was that it turned out to be very treatable – once she got on the right medication all of her organ damage reversed. She got better!

Today, Malee is three years old and thriving. She has some slow devel-



opment and hearing problems but, beyond that, all of her medical problems have gone away. And on top of that, she is now in the process of being adopted – something that doesn't always happen for children who come to Hope Home.

Thanks to BMS work at Hope Home, children with disabilities are being shown God's love and given the care that they need.

Responding to Hurricane Matthew

BMS World Mission authorised a grant for £22,150 to help provide cholera treatment in the hard-hit south of Haiti.

Widespread flooding and poor sanitation are predicted to cause cases of cholera to surge in the wake of Hurricane Matthew, which hit Haiti in October 2016.

BMS was in touch with partners on the ground to find out the most helpful way to respond to the hurricane, and the provision of cholera treatment was identified as one of the urgent needs. We agreed to provide a grant of £22,150 to help

towards treatment for 1,200 cholera patients. This treatment will be provided through a hospital on the south west tip of Haiti, serving people hit by the heart of Hurricane Matthew.

We have a history of helping to prevent cholera and caring for cholera patients in Haiti. Following the 2010 earthquakes, we worked with a partner in Cap-Haitien to help reduce the cholera-related mortality rate from around 13 per cent to under 0.5 per cent. We believe and pray that we can help do the same for people in the south of the country following this latest disaster.

“Haiti is one of the most marginalised and fragile countries in the world,” says Steve Sanderson, Deputy Director for Mission. “As we stand with the people of Haiti following Hurricane Matthew, we want to ensure that we demonstrate the love of Christ through helping those directly affected.”



My Favourite Psalm

Psalm 139: A Time and a Place

Continuing our series of Favourite Psalms that began with sermons at Sent last summer, Nathan Shipley, selects a Psalm for a particular time.

Being asked to choose my favourite Psalm, was like being asked to choose my favourite film. Impossible!

There is a time and a place for every film.

If I want to be on the edge of my seat, I watch *Rear Window*. If I want to escape on an adventure, I watch *Raiders of the Lost Ark*. If I want to

dance with somebody, I watch *Dirty Dancing*.

There is a time and a place for every Psalm.

If I want to be comforted, I read Psalm 23. If I want to wallow, I read Psalm 88. If I want to remember God's faithfulness, I read Psalm 124.

As I wasn't able to identify *My Favourite Psalm*, I rephrased the title and shared on *A Favourite Psalm*.

Psalm 139 is a favourite Psalm because it has had a time and a place throughout my life.

I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made

I don't remember much from my time spent in Sunday School, however I do distinctly remember discussing Psalm 139.14 during a session at Aspley Evangelical Church.

After reading that verse we were asked, "What does it mean that you



are fearfully and wonderfully made?”

As an opinionated teenager who thought he knew all the answers, I was somewhat surprised that I did not have an answer - and I still don't!

I find it truly mind blowing that the God who created the universe is the same God who made me. I wasn't a rush job either! The intricacies of the human body testify to God's attention to detail.

I am not carelessly and awfully made - I am fearfully and wonderfully made! I am not unique in that either. Each and every single human being that has ever existed was fearfully and wonderfully made by God!

All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be.

I can recall many happy memories from NCYH Camps and it was at a Summer Camp in the mid-noughties that Psalm 139 made another impression.

Beth Rookwood (nee Tash) spent the week sharing the good news of the kingdom over techno beats. During one of the sessions, while

unpacking this Psalm, Beth created a high street aide memoir: MK1.

Made. Known. 1st.

(This hook was even more effective for those of us from Nottingham as there was a MK1 store in the Broadmarsh Shopping Centre!)

Wherever we are, whatever we are doing, whoever we are with, we were made and known first by God.



Before everything, God knew us. There are no surprises, twists or uncertainties. God has quite literally written the book on you and me!

Again, I still can't really comprehend what that simple statement means. Before anything and everything, God knew us. There are no surprises, twists or uncertainties. God has quite literally written the book on you and me!

Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts.

See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting.

At various points in my life I have endeavoured to memorise Bible verses. As a child the main incentive was prizes. As an older teenager the main purpose was protection. As a twenty-something the main drive was pride.

The final two verses of Psalm 139 are David's heartfelt plea for God to continue to humble him. In the book of Acts, David is described as a man after God's own heart and yet he still knew that there was work for God to do on his attitude, character and daily living.

When I set these verses to memory, I was well aware that I was not the finished article and I am happy to type that I am still a work in progress.

You knit me together in my mother's womb.

There are many perks to working for the church - days off in the week, unquantifiable amounts of quiche and being able to bend hospital visiting hours!

One of the greatest privileges is the opportunities it creates to share in

people's lives.

On one occasion a tearful woman sought refuge in my office. Even though I didn't know her that well, I felt comfortable enough to let her take a moment. I grabbed a box of tissues and began to listen to her story.

She was in the early stages of pregnancy, however she was fearful as she had suffered several miscarriages. As the conversation went on I tried to say as little as possible and when the time seemed right I offered to pray.

I didn't really know where to begin so I just kept it simple and as I was praying Psalm 139.13 came to mind. I asked God to knit the child together in their mother's womb and God did.

There is a time and a place for Psalm 139.

Yea, O Lord and King, grant me to see my own transgressions, and not to judge my brother, for blessed art Thou, unto ages of ages. Amen.

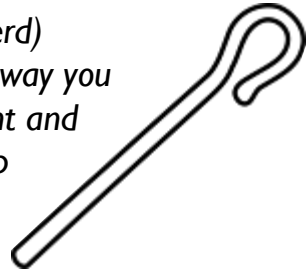
Prayers on the Names of God

Ford's Focus

John's Gospel Part 11: Where is Jesus?

Steve Ford's Bible study continues in John Chapter 8.

According to Jesus Christ, to be a disciple we have to continue in Jesus' word and by continuing in his word he says "you shall know the truth and this truth will make you free" (John 8.31-32).

Immediately the Pharisees tried to justify their freedom saying that they were of the seed of Abraham and therefore did not need to be set free because they believed they were free already. Jesus cuts straight to the point and says anyone who commits sin is the servant of sin, he knows the heart of a man or women, no-one else knows that



except the man or woman themselves: what insight.

When we truly know what we are because we have been exposed by the word of Jesus we can really do business with God on His ground. The ground that is the very depths of our being, the place of the heart, the spiritual place. What I am talking about does not take place in the realm of the natural or the realm of the intellect. If we truly want to know God and His freedom then we have to find the spiritual place in our lives and then endeavour to find God there.

We need to ask Him to reveal himself to us again in a fresh and living way

In order for that process to begin we have to let go all of our preconceptions and doctrines (both about God and our existence and our origins), that is everything we have accumulated through our lives, in order for us to get back to the real

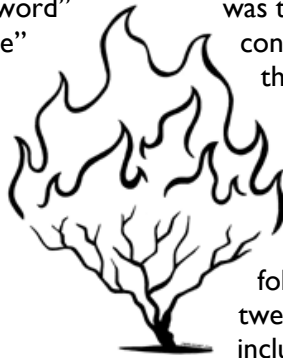
issue, the issue of God himself, and when there we need to ask Him to reveal himself to us again in a fresh and living way.

We do this by abiding in “The Word” and “The Word” will set us free. Paul points out in Romans 6.12-13 where he says “let not sin reign in your body”, “neither yield your members (you as a whole person) as instruments of unrighteousness unto sin, but yield yourselves unto God as those that are alive....” So what we learn here is that by continuing in “the word”, “the word” will set us free. To “continue” requires an action on our part. Christ died for Sin once for all but for us to live in that freedom requires us to make daily choices to yield to God in order for us to live in the truth that has set us free.

In John 8.28 Jesus says “when you have lifted up the son of man then you shall know that I am”. Here in this verse Jesus is talking about his death. He came into this fallen world, as a man, with the full knowledge and understanding of His purpose. What he says here to the Jews, the people who knew all about the one true God but who did not know God is “then you shall know that I am”.

At this point let us refresh our memories and go back to Exodus 3.1-14 to the man that God chose to lead His people out of bondage and the slavery of Egypt. When Moses was attracted by God by means of a burning bush, he was a man who had fallen from exceptional grace and privilege from Pharaoh’s inner circle to the place of a wandering shepherd in the desert where he was shepherding sheep for his father-in-law.

The burning bush in itself was not exceptional, what was exceptional was that the bush was not consumed by the fire. It was this that caught Moses’ attention and he turned to observe, and it was in the “turning to observe” that God spoke to him. What follows is a dialogue between the two of them that includes the phrase “I AM



THAT I AM” part of the phrase that God requires Moses to say to the children of Israel in response to his question “who shall I say has sent me?” God says you say “I AM has sent me” (Exodus 3.14). God then follows on in verse 15 and says “The Lord God of your fathers.....has sent me” and “this is my name forever”. So we see in the passage in John 8 that Jesus is saying you shall know that I AM. It is Jesus

saying I and the Father are one.

It is when we begin to acknowledge and accept that Christ has been crucified and has risen that we then begin to understand that He is the I AM. It is then that Jesus says to those who believe “if you continue in my word then you are my disciples indeed: and you shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free.” So we see salvation is first about belief in a crucified and risen Christ then about continuing in Jesus’ word. It is about abiding on a daily basis, minute by minute, hour by hour, always giving God the glory and praise in everything we do and say, so that others might come to see the crucified and risen Christ. It is not about working out the theology, it is about accepting that Jesus is I AM and that I AM has come down in response to the cry of longing that has gone up for truth and freedom.

When God revealed that His name of I AM to Moses was to be His name forever in the meeting at the burning bush, God also revealed that He had seen the afflictions of His people which are in Egypt, He had heard their cry, He knew their sorrows and that I AM come down to deliver them, to bring them out in order to bring them in to something far greater. This “I AM come down” is denoted in the original Hebrew as being permanent in the past with certainty and permanency in the future. This “I AM come down” is important for all of us, it is God with us, Immanuel.

Do we know and appreciate this Jesus today? Are we one of those who believed into Jesus, into the one who said before Abraham was I AM, or are we like those Pharisees just trying to argue away the truth and in so doing blind ourselves and those around us?

Let us purpose in our lives to find this I AM and continue in his word in order that the truth will set us free.

Thoroughly Equipped

Leeds School of Theology

In January, eight intrepid South Paraders embarked on the Leeds School of Theology. Over the next twelve months, we will catch up with the students to find out how the course is going and how we can support them.

Why have you embarked on the LSOT?

Not long after I became a Christian I knew that I wanted to go to Bible college “some day”. LSOT enables me to study some theology, which will hopefully both equip me for life and provide some foundations for my preaching, whilst enabling me to continue to work full-time. I had been thinking about doing a distance learning course, but knew that would be tough motivationally as I wouldn’t have any face-to-face contact. I have heard that some university theology courses can be hard faith-wise, so it’s important to

me that the people teaching the course are Christians with the aim of helping us in our walk with God rather than hindering it.

What are you enjoying about the adventure so far?

I was really encouraged by the fact that there were about 110 there on that first Saturday, with about 70 people in my intake. How fantastic that there are so many people who are keen to know more of God. Some had travelled a fair distance to get there.

It is interesting to be challenged to think about questions such as “What are the fundamentals of the Christian faith?”, or to put the question another way, “What beliefs are essential for someone to be a Christian?” Different people will draw the line in different places.

I hope the course will help me know the Bible better, understand it better, and live out its teaching better.

How do you hope to grow through the experience?

I hope to know the Bible better, understand it better, and live out its teaching better.

What would you say to encourage people to start in 2018?

Do you want to know God better? Do you want to be equipped with the tools to really suck the marrow out of the Bible? Do you want a better understanding of how we (the church) got to where we are today? Do you want to meet with Christians from all sorts of different backgrounds from across Yorkshire and the north?

If you answered “Yes!” to any of these questions, consider applying next year. The course is aimed to encourage Christians in their walk with God, to lead to greater love for others, and is mindful of the need for practical application. We

meet for a (very) full day once a month, and then there is another 6-8 hours’ work expected on top of that to get the most out of the course. It is unaccredited, and works on the basis that “You get out what you put in”.

How can we pray for you as you continue with the LSOT adventure?

I am conscious that I may not walk this way again. My prayer for this course is that I’d really be able to make the most of every opportunity for learning. I hope that it will give me tools to improve my preaching. I’d like to know God more, as that is eternal life (John 17:3), and I think one of the really big challenges is to apply what I learn practically. The Bible is a challenging book!

Revive and Thrive

Introducing JustAct Middle East and Merath

At the Carols by Candlelight service in December Gareth Iball spoke about JustAct Middle East, a charity of which he is a trustee. He introduced JustAct and spoke specifically about Merath which is an organisation working with Syrian and Iraqi refugees in Lebanon.

JustAct are currently running an appeal to raise funds to support Merath and their increasingly important work. The retiring offering at the carol service was donated to JustAct's appeal, and the total amount given to date is £448.75! We would like to thank everyone that has donated for their incredible generosity, and also South Parade for allowing us to make this appeal at the carol service. We are hoping to send the money on to Merath in late February so there is still time to give!

JustAct Middle East is a UK charity that was set up in 2011

by the five current Trustees, three of which are or were regular worshippers at SPBC. Our mission is to nurture hope among marginalised people, by partnering with locally-run organisations whose work provides for their needs, and brings about social inclusion. We dream of a more inclusive Middle East in which a person's ethnicity, disability, religion or nationality do not pose a barrier to the fulfilment of their potential.

Our ethos is built around the words in Micah 6.8: *“And this is what*



the Lord requires of you, to act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with your God.”. These values of justice, compassion and humility are at the centre of our partnerships with organisations in the Middle East. At present we have formal partnerships with two organisations: The Jerusalem Princess Basma Centre for Disabled Children (www.basma-centre.org) - which helps disabled children to reach their full potential through a range of therapies and services; and The Gaza Community Mental Health Programme (www.gcmhp.com) - which empowers the most vulnerable members of Gazan society through community-based mental health services and training.



nary – some of you may remember their Executive Director, Nabil Costa, who visited us at SPBC some years ago. The Community and Development arm of LSESD is known as MERATH (Middle East Revive and Thrive). The word merath means inheritance in Arabic, and their purpose is to empower communities to reach their full potential as sons and daughters of God.



In addition to this we also have growing links with the Lebanese Society for Educational and Social Development (LSESD) www.lsesd.org This is a large organisation which includes the Arab Baptist Theological Semi-

This is achieved through a number of areas of work including: education, basic assistance, food assistance, trauma support and action against gender-based violence. For example, Merath have enabled over 1,000 Syrian refugees in Lebanon to attend education programs, even ensuring that they are taught the Syrian curriculum. They provide monthly food vouchers/boxes to over 1,900 houses in Lebanon, more than 5,550 in Syria and 105 in Iraq. Merath also provides training

to promote gender equality in the Syrian and Iraqi refugee communities.

The ongoing humanitarian crisis in the region seems to be unending

The work of Merath is desperately needed given the ongoing humanitarian crisis in the region: Lebanon, a small country of only 4.5 million people, has received 1.6 million Syrian refugees, 70% of whom are living below the poverty line; 11 million Syrians have either been killed or have left their country, and 13.5 million are in desperate need of humanitarian assistance; whilst in Iraq there are 3.3 million internally displaced people and 11 million in need of humanitarian assistance.

Merath is working tirelessly to meet their needs and they invite you to join hands with them as they respond to the needs of vulnerable families affected by the Syria crisis. This seems to be an unending crisis and we are therefore asking you to consider making a donation to support their work.

Truth RIP?

Driving back from a family funeral I listened on Radio 4 to a discussion about possible bias in BBC reporting. The various speakers clearly believed that equal weight had to be given to different and conflicting opinions. The idea that one might be correct and others false was not even considered.

I have lived through “economical with the truth”, “burying bad news”, “spin” and now we have “alternative facts”. I was brought up to believe in always telling the truth. If you don’t tell lies it makes other sins less easy, except perhaps pride.

In large public bodies corporate “face saving” is all too often seen to

be paramount, whatever the truth and whatever the cost, as some fellow church members have experienced. Truth seems to be an outdated and discarded concept. When did I last hear a sermon on the ninth commandment (or any of them for that matter)? But the Bible is clear; “*Whoever of you loves life and desires to see many good days, keep your tongue from evil and your*

lips from telling lies.” (Psalm 34.12-13).

As a young man I became a scientist because of a dedication to truth - “you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free”, a quotation which really needs to be taken in full: “If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free.” (John 8:31-32).

Sometimes truth can be difficult, as with “Can humans get mad cow disease?” When this question was



most urgent the best answer anyone could give was “We don’t know, it is possible but on balance we think it is relatively unlikely to happen”. Press and politicians wanted “yes” or “no”, but the nearest anyone could get to the truth could not be expressed that way.

However there are simple true statements, such as “For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that

whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.” (John 3.16); and “Jesus answered, ‘I am the way and the truth and the life. No-one comes to the Father except through me.’” (John 14.6).

Let us stick to truth, and try to distinguish between it and lies masquerading as alternative opinions in all areas of life.

The (Un)known God

Our Mission Partner Chris Gnanakan, working with pastors in Asia through OTAN, and based in Boston, USA, recently sent his greetings to the church along with these thoughts on the gospel in today's modern world.

Today, we see that contemporary society is more interested in living the “good life” than knowing or doing the right thing!

The focus is on individualism and a selfish pursuit of personal satisfaction. Postmodernity has eroded us of absolutes, while secular humanism has left us with a moral relativism that is sceptical of



exclusive truth. As pluralists, we are supposed to tolerate all things; therefore, anyone who believes in absolutes is arrogant. Savvy issues on social networks pull us into the latest trends, but de-link us from accessing the truth about life's ultimate purpose.

Is ignorance really bliss? How can intellectual knowledge make us so narcissistic? At Athens, Paul reasons with such philosophers and boldly presents biblical truth that can set us free (Acts 17.16-34)! Here, we will also examine a useful example of how the gospel prevails in any pluralistic society.

The infamous Greco-Roman city, Athens, was notoriously hedonistic. Pleasure was so important that they would argue over ways to please themselves while avoiding consequential pain. They pushed all moral limits to feel good, typically using two opposing schools of thought. The Epicureans were naturalists, whose slogan was, “Don't worry, be happy!” Their lives centered around earthly



happiness without concern about death or the afterlife.

In contrast, the Stoics were pantheistic, believing the whole cosmos is god - a divine spark within that unites humanity with everything else. They stressed the exercise of reason and self-discipline. Unlike the disengaged god of Epicurean Deism, Stoic pantheists believed in endless cycles of rebirth.

Therefore, at Athens, we see a sample of the New Agers and the New Atheists of today. This instructive approach begins with Paul noticing and commending them for their religiosity. Nonetheless, he was deeply disturbed at the idolatry that refused to acknowledge the unseen Creator. Finding this entry point, he tells them about Jesus and what God has done for humanity by raising him from the dead. He begins with "God's goodness," not "human badness". Then, via Jesus' resurrection, he established who Jesus Christ was and God's offer of salvation and eternal life. Although his audience scorned him as a

scavenger teaching new and strange things, Paul cleverly quotes their own philosophers to effectively communicate the gospel in their context, then demands a verdict!

Paul's message on the Mars Hill's marketplace of ideas placed God back where he rightly belongs as the sovereign Creator, only Saviour and the coming Judge. Paul informed the pagans, who had never engaged with the Jewish Bible or heard of the Messiah, that ignorance, or suppression of *the Truth* about Jesus (God's only Way to Life) is not bliss.

Even now, we are called to take the Gospel to all nations who have not yet heard, or have deliberately suppressed the truth. From ancient times to now, we see hedonism, the problem of placing pleasure above all things. Sadly, we are more devoted to our false gods of materialism and secular humanism that remake God into our own image. This universal Gospel calls us to respond by repenting from sin and turning to God by placing our faith in what Christ has accomplished for us. Let us prepare now for Jesus' Second Coming by living out the reason for our living hope!

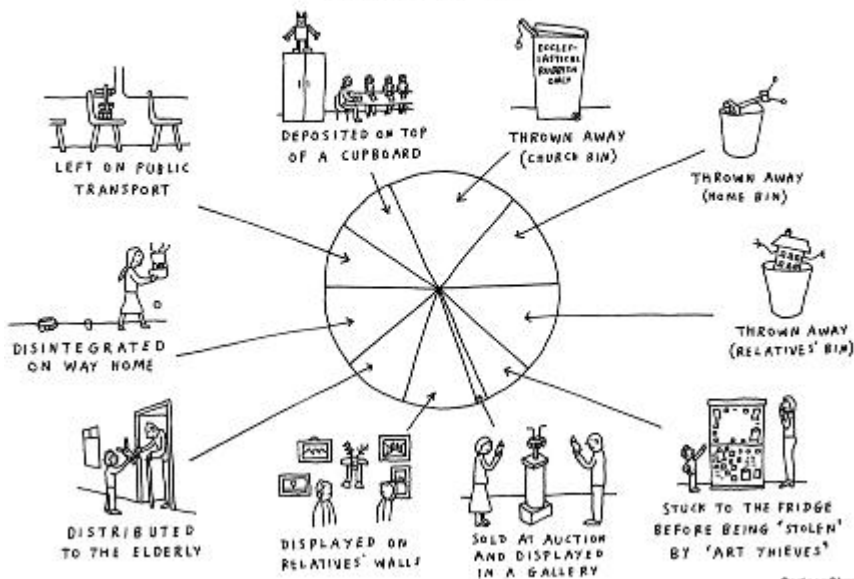
