Arabic Fellowship

As well as meeting in the Green House every Sunday afternoon, the Leeds Arabic Christian Fellowship also has other activities.

Back in July, we had a Middle East stand in the "Hope for the Nations" outreach in Briggate. The object is to show that the church is multi-cultural and multi-national. We had Bible portions in Arabic and Kurdish, as well as Middle East fingerfood such as dates and nuts. Many good conversations took place - at the end of the day we reckoned we had spoken with people from at least 14 of the 22 Arabic-speaking countries. Two young men contacted came to our Sunday meeting the next day.

The weather wasn't so good for our outing to Pugneys Park, Wakefield at the end of August. About 40 turned up and we had a good time together, though

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having the BBQ under umbrellas isn't ideal! One Iraqi woman lived nearby and invited us to her home to dry out, so we ended the day enjoying warm Arab hospitality.

Sunday afternoons see about 15 to 20 meeting in the Green House. Most are already following Jesus, but some from non-Christian backgrounds are still seeking. Yagoub usually gives the Bible message, but we have also enjoyed Paul Rockley coming every couple of months to continue a very helpful series on "Christ in all the Scriptures" – in English, of course, but with Arabic translation!

Every month or two, we have an outreach lunch, with plenty of delicious Middle Eastern food. It's a good opportunity to invite those who are not yet Christians. Our next outreach will be on Sunday 11 December, with an experienced Iraqi/Egyptian couple coming to speak – please pray for a good number to come and to respond to the message.

On 9 October the service had a little shake-up to celebrate harvest. Children from the Junior Church groups led us in prayer and the whole congregation were invited to plant a prayer bulb each, which I noticed have recently started to send up shoots.

The sanctuary was beautifully decorated, including harvest themed posters designed by children in the God's Gang of Junior Church. One of the designs has been used for the poster outside church and looks great. Donations of food to local food banks are still gratefully being received up to Christmas.

Christmas came early to South Parade, with a craft fair held on 5 November in aid of various charities. The sales continued on the following Sunday morning and a big thank you goes out to all those who supported it.

There was a Mission Community meeting on Thursday 10 November, with a few items to bring to your wider attention: A joint initiative between Headingley Morning and Sent is taking shape, to develop a relationship with Leeds Rhinos Rugby League Club. There is great potential to reach out to men, who are widely recognised as being a section of the population resistant to the call of the gospel and being involved with church life.


There is a need in our local community to support asylum seekers. There is a program through which this need can be met, which involves helping people to develop their English language skills by engaging in conversation.

We're looking at what resources we have available, both in terms of venue and volunteers. Paul Rockley has been a key contact in progress so far, so if you are interested and would like further information, please don't hesitate to ask him about it.



Liz Crathern follows up the references from Steve Ford's sermon on holiness at Headingley Morning on 30 October.

istening to the sermon and being led through the message of holiness, being set apart, I felt God encouraging me to take notes of the many biblical references Steve was referring to – not something I would normally do during the sermon. I prefer to concentrate on the spoken word.

However, Steve was moving back and forth between the Old and New Testament encouraging the congregation to read the verses as we journeyed through the sermon. I found myself captivated by how God was speaking through Steve's interpretation of the text – reminding us all "God works out what God has worked in". This was a powerful reminder of God's love for us and His desire for us to be set apart – to be both salt and light. This was a powerful reminder of God's desire for us to be set apart

I met a young man on my train journey back from Plymouth recently – we ended up sitting next to each other on this very busy train and talked for four and a half hours

about our personal faith journeys. He told me he is working with prisons, was on his way

back from Dartmouth, also studying a module on systematic theology and I promised him I would send him a synopsis of the sermon that we were discussing as it seemed to me to be a clear systematic focus on Holiness.

My Favourite Psalm

Psalm 73: Holding Fast in the Storm

Geoff Greer has reworked for this magazine the notes from which he spoke last August in Sent's series on favourite Psalms.

he Bible is a very honest book. In the Psalms especially we see the writers agonising over the difficulties they have with life and indeed faith. "All human life is there".

In this Psalm we see a reverse of the prosperity gospel; far from faith bringing health and material prosperity, the writer (Asaph) laments how "the wicked" are prospering



whilst he struggles to honour God in his life. Life seemed so unfair to him...and maybe it does to us as well.

Asaph began to come to terms with all this when he "entered the sanctuary of God and understood their final destiny" (verse 17). He (and we) needed to draw near to God and gain an eternal perspective.

So much then for the wicked; but what of us? In verse 23-24 there are four things to remember and they all concern God and what He will do. The psalmist says "Yet..."

Presence (verse 23a)

"I am always with You" – God is with each one of His people. True well-being is found in a personal relationship with God. It is "good to be near God" – verse 28a. Look also at Exodus 33.14, Isaiah 43.2/5a and Matthew 28.20b.

Do you need to know again that in your trying circumstances **He is with** you?



Protection (verse 23b)

"You hold me by my right hand" – our security is to be found in God. See also Deuteronomy 33.27 and Psalm 73.28.

"Our security rests not on our feeble hold on Him but on His mighty grip on us". Think of the illustration of helping a young child cross the road: we would let them hold our hand, we would grip around theirs. Chris Gnanakan often signs his emails "In His Grip".

n John 10.28-9, referring to our eternal salvation, Jesus says no-one can snatch us from His hand... or the Father's hand.

Do you need to know again that you are held by His mighty right hand?

Pointing the way (verse 24a) "You guide me with Your counsel" – He wants to lead us through life's tangled pathway. Look at Isaiah 40.11 and Psalm 25.9.

Jesus specifically promised His followers an ongoing counsellor – John 14.16-17a.

God knows we often don't know which way to turn, so He speaks to

us through His word and through his people, when we open ourselves up to Him. Margaret and I found that when we were serious about this and made time for God to speak in Northumbria, we heard very clearly from Him.

Do you need to know again that God will not leave us floundering, that **He** will point the way for us?

Prospect (verse 24b) "...And afterwards You will take me into glory". See Psalm 49.15 – He will take us to Himself.

> See also Psalm 16.9-11 and Psalm 23.6. Here is a real long-term perspective! Also 2 Corinthians 4.17-18.

We need an eternal perspective to deal with the unfairnesses and troubles of this life. God's purposes for us cover everything.

hristian joy and peace are not just about "pie in the sky when we die" (three of the four points here concern our life here on earth) but heaven is part of the deal! We need an eternal perspective to deal with the unfairnesses and troubles of this life, but also to know that God's purposes for us cover everything. We can know forgiveness and power now and a future more fully in His presence.

Summing up

- For now we have His presence, His protection and His pointing of the way ahead.
- For eternity we have the sure hope of sharing in His glory.
- May we all experience afresh all He has for us.



Mary, Be Encouraged!

Chris Gnanakan, our Mission Partner with OTAN (Outreach to Asian Nationals), based in the US, sent the church his best wishes, and these reflections on the Christmas story.

ave you ever wondered what Christmas meant to Mary who was "expecting Jesus"? Before she had a relationship with her fiancé Joseph, an angel announces her pregnancy! Her wedding plans shattered, and gripped with fear, this poor, peasant teenager exclaims: "How can this be?" Our ministry can become messy and high expectations can lead to deep disappointments. Like



Mary let us recognise how God works in ordinary people, in extraordinary ways and... be encouraged!

> Mary needed God's reassurance, providence, strength, and encouragement

Focusing on the hopes the Christchild brought, we forget the anxiety that crippled Mary's soul in her cultural context. Today, sadly, her pregnancy could be a justifiable case for abortion. She literally delivered Jesus in a parking lot where travellers kept their animals. To bring forth what God sent forth and bring up the One she knew was her "Saviour" was no easy task. Mary had to flee with Jesus into Egypt as an asylum seeker. In all of this, did Mary lose heart? At each stage, what she needed was God's reassurance, providence, strength, and encouragement.

Mary found enabling grace as God strategically used some unexpected people to encourage her. Imagine



her trying to explain the angel's visit and her pregnancy to Joseph! She must have wondered if he would reject her, scorn her in public, or demand she be stoned as an adulteress!

et Joseph as a "righteous man", committed to do God's will, shows kindness and takes her to be his wife. Moreover, Mary needed someone to confide with who could understand the changes taking place in her. God had prepared Elizabeth, her Spirit-filled cousin, who herself in old age was carrying a

"miracle" child. She reassures Mary that her child was their "Lord" and without judgment, welcomes and cares for Mary during her first trimester. How encouraging!

As Mary laid Jesus in a feeding trough, an angelic host announces His birth to lowly shepherds in Bethlehem. These first visitors to the manger received a "sign" that both helped them identify Mary's child and clarify that her baby was God's Davidic King and Saviour, "Christ the Lord!" As was customary, Mary and Joseph go to the temple where the prophet Simeon and Anna confirm her child to be the long-awaited Messiah and hope of all the nations. Two years later, Gentile wise men come with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh and worship this Christ child.

Did you notice the cross-section of society represented in this diverse group, each who turn up at different stages of Jesus' development to encourage Mary? Even before Jesus' birth, God uses a close family member, Elizabeth to

emotionally encourage her. On a personal level, Mary is encouraged as Joseph courageously steps up as her life partner to physically help bring up her boy. At Jesus' birth, shepherds,

socially from a lower class, come to reassure Mary with a sign from heaven. At her baby's dedication, Simeon and Anna give her the spiritual assurance that she is a vital part of God fulfilling his promises to the Jews and Gentiles. Magi, rich philosophers, visit Jesus as a toddler and provided Mary with the financial resources needed to raise Jesus.

t this "most wonderful time of the year" let us, with Mary, ponder the many ways that God has provided for us, and thank Him for those people he uses to strengthen us as we serve Him!

Ford's Focus

John's Gospel Part 10: Knowing Jesus

Steve Ford's study in John's gospel reaches chapter 7 many people are now questioning Jesus' authority

n John 7.25-27 we see the inhabitants of Jerusalem questioning among themselves that maybe, just maybe, their leaders know or even have a hunch that this man could be the Christ. The Authorised Version puts it like this: "Do the rulers know indeed that this is very Christ?", drawing attention to the fact that the Jews thought they knew what "very Christ" meant.

The Jews had been taught about the living God and His rescue package for centuries and now that it was here under their noses very few recognised it. I suppose the ques-



tion for us today is do we recognise and know the Messiah or are we conditioned to think that He will appear in a certain way or do we just think He has arrived and that we do not need to do anything else?

Many people were divided as to who Jesus was. There were those who thought that he was demon possessed (verse 20). Some thought he was the Messiah but doubted because they had fixed ideas that the Messiah would come in a certain way and they would not know where he came from (verse 27).

The real problem that people had was that the establishment, the leaders, the Pharisees, did not believe and therefore cast doubt on the whole question. The Pharisees believed that they had the answers - after all they had studied intently, the trouble was they listened to men and not to God. They couldn't even get it right when it came to the tradition of circumcision, believing that it was Moses who instigated it when in fact it was God through Abraham (verses 21-24) that was the archi-

tect of the act, in order to seal the covenant between himself and Mankind. It was Moses who declared, through spiritual insight, that this act was indeed an act that needed

to be accomplished in the heart not in the flesh.

The key to knowing lesus lies in verse 17

where Jesus says "If any is willing to do his will (God's) he shall know of the doctrine whether it be of God or whether I speak of myself." Here we have Jesus pointing out spiritual truth.

Many believed because of what Jesus had done. Why do some people take more convincing than others?

The original Greek for "will" has the present continuous tense and the word "do" has the infinitive mood so when put together there is a sense of urgency, it is a constant continuous action, one that changes our direction and understanding. It is in the "will do" that we know whether the doctrine is of God. The "will do" is quickened by faith. As everything is spiritual the "will do" has to be a spiritual action. Spirit communes only with spirit.

Jesus points out that the people can

know who he is and where he is from, that is physically, yet he says "the one who sent me is true and you don't know him" (verse 28), that is they did not know him in the now,

> in the present, spiritually. Do we know him and where he is from in the now, spiritually?

In verse 31 it is recorded that many believed because of what Jesus had already done. Why is it that some people take more convincing than others?

n all of this confusion and muddle at the end of the feast Jesus stood up and said *"if any thirst let him come to me and drink"* (verse 37). He also says that belief in him will result with a flow of Living Water, a baptism that had not yet been witnessed but would come at Pentecost.


Have we heard the cry "If any thirst"? Are we witnesses to the Living Water flowing out of our depths that not only changes us but changes and enthuses those around us? Do we still doubt who Jesus is even though we have had him pointed out to us? Or are we those who have said "Yes, I see him, believe in him and will follow him whatever the cost"?


