Written over 40 years ago, Leslie Earnshaw's lines begin to sum it up for me. Nothing compares with the Christmas story.

The Christmas journey rings in harmony with so many of the elements of our theme for this year of being pioneers, travellers and settlers. The Bible describes Jesus as a pioneer (Hebrews 12.2 TNIV). Not only is he the one who is the start point for our faith (the author), but he also blazes the trail with all its attendant risks.

It is the coming of this helpless baby

collective gasp of concern.

These were stunning love journeys which far outshine anything most of us will ever do. But I dare to say that even these, though Christlike in character, could not compare with the self-giving of the Creator on

that journey that led to the cross
and on through death to
resurrection, releasing eternal life
for any and all who will come by
faith to him.

I hope we will never forget

more so we must not take
Christmas lightly. Stripping away all
the tinsel, myth and folklore that
the years have laid on top we must
let the story of the deepest love of
all shine through and grip our lives.

Around the Church

That New Sign!

You may have been wondering about that new sign on the wall above the Green House! The Arabic Fellowship is very grateful to be able to use the Green House every Sunday afternoon, and for the close links that we enjoy with South Parade.

We feel the Arabic needs a bit of explanation, so that South Parade members know what it says and can explain it to others. Of the 4 lines in Arabic:

- Line 1 just says “Leeds Arabic Christian Fellowship”
- Line 2 explains “We meet here at 3.30pm every Sunday”
- Line 3 says “Welcome” – (*ahlan wa sahlan*) – try learning your first words in Arabic!
- Line 4 is from John 14.6 to give a Gospel challenge – “*Jesus said: I am the way, the truth and the life*”. If you want to extend your Arabic vocabulary, this is: “*qaala Yasuua: ana huwa attareek wa alhakk wa alhayaat*”. Try it out on one of us!

We are getting from 15 to 20 people meeting each Sunday, from a variety of countries – Iraq, Syria, Sudan, Egypt, Kurdistan, southern Iran – along with a few Brits who know a bit of Arabic. Yagoub (from Sudan) usually gives the Bible teaching (in Arabic), but recently we enjoyed having Brian give the message by translation – despite his



many gifts, he hasn't mastered Arabic yet!

Every couple of months we have an outreach meeting, preceded by a lunch, and this attracts 40 to 50. Our next one will be on Sunday 7 December, when Dr Sameh Hanna, an Egyptian from Manchester, will be our speaker.

There are many Arabic-speaking students in the Leeds universities, as well as asylum seekers and long-term residents. We long that many, both from a nominal Christian and a Muslim background, will decide to follow Jesus, and we value your prayers. And pray too, every time you pass "That New Sign", that it will attract interest.

Romania: Smiles but no Vampires

The youth group from South Parade Baptist Church have visited Romania with the aid of the Smiles Foundation for the second time, this time with a few younger members but a couple who came last time who were back for round two. It has been a long journey from idea to actualisation but 13 members ventured out there to try and do some good. For the majority this was their first time to Romania and on a mission trip in general, so this was a whole new world to most.

As one of the few who had come two years ago and

returned, I felt honoured to be able to see the progression of the Smiles Foundation's work out there. Many of the project's works out there can be quite evocative and definitely an experience to be remembered but not necessarily enjoyed. So such progression in such a short amount of time is quite amazing to see.

For example one project out there is visiting the homeless and so we encountered a lot of people who could not dream of the luxuries we possess. One man in particular was sat on the pavement outside a public toilet, pulled out an inhaler and said "this is all I own". Romania shows that even in the EU, in the 21st century, countries are still unable to provide for their citizens and this is only a two and a half hour flight from our doorstep.

Though Romania may have provided some deeply emotional memories it has also provided for some incredible celebrations. We were very lucky to have been there for the grand opening of their Elderly Care centre in Oradea or ECO. This was an EU funded building with a €1,000,000 price tag, which Smiles were asked if they could manage the running of. It was merely a husk of a building when Smiles received it

and so they decided to convert it into an elderly care centre.

On the opening day we all came to the centre with a few members of the press and even the Mayor of Oradea. The Mayor of Oradea was so impressed by this great group from the UK that later that week he invited us all for coffee and cake in the town hall in which he shared his appreciation for people from another country coming to his city to help his people. It was a very touching moment which showed the instrumental effect of the Smiles foundation on local politics and the power of caring for our fellow man.

As a second comer I believe that the Smiles Foundation is doing great work and even though SPBC has been a minor player in the work and successes of Smiles in the grand scheme of things, we can know as we come home that we have helped somebody, even if it was delivering food to families, giving blankets to the homeless, or even giving a child a hug and a smile.



At SENT it seems that we are a

to the neighbours of South Parade,

appreciated these gestures.

Following on from this a group

an introduction to the challenges of

SENT has enjoyed opportunities to

other mission communities, such as

The Church that El Puente Built

Thanks to BMS World Mission supporters, 9-10 August was a very special weekend for the church the Williamsons planted five years ago.

In August, El Puente, a church planted by BMS mission workers Anjanette and Scott Williamson in Cusco, Peru, celebrated both its fifth anniversary and the opening of a brand new church building.

The church opening was packed and among the 190 who attended was the church's next door neighbour, Santiago*. He was angry with the church when, during the construction of the building, they accidentally put a pneumatic drill through his wall. For months after, Scott spoke with Santiago, trying to improve relations between him and the church and offering him a front row seat for the opening of the building.

On the opening night, Santiago was there, and the next day he was there again for the fifth anniversary celebrations. With a his-

tory of alcoholism and other personal struggles, Santiago was bowled over by the reception he received. "I think I have found a place where I feel accepted," he told Scott.

Before the new building, El Puente worshipped in a room with a maximum capacity of 60. Now they can seat up to 190. Before, they had a small room for Sunday school. Now they have four rooms for Sunday school and a kitchen for hospitality – giving them opportunities to serve their community in new ways, with



plans for a youth club and café for older people.

“To open the building on Saturday night and then on Sunday to celebrate the fifth anniversary of the

church was, for me as a church planter, quite amazing,” says Scott. “There are exciting days ahead for El Puente.”

Disaster Recovery

Through your gifts, BMS can respond to disasters when they happen. There are no quick fixes when it comes to disasters. Recovery and rebuilding after a war, drought or tsunami can take decades. But, thanks to your gifts, we're able to work with local partners on the ground to give both emergency aid and grants for long-term recovery – letting devastated communities see that they are not forgotten. Between June and September 2014, BMS provided support in the following places facing huge challenges:



- **Gaza, £10,000**

Following the recent bombardment and subsequent humanitarian crisis in Gaza, BMS is providing food packages for 180 struggling Christian and Muslim families, through Gaza Baptist Church.

- **Lebanon, £19,600**

To help support a Director for Community Development and Relief to enable our partner the Lebanese Society for Educational and Social Development to continue to respond to the needs of desperate Syrian refugees in Lebanon.

- **Sri Lanka, £4,150**

To help conflict-affected families to create sustainable livelihoods by providing a rice milling service, in partnership with the Lanka Evangelical Alliance Development Society.

- **Sri Lanka, £2,000**

Drought is affecting districts in the arid north east of Sri Lanka. BMS is helping to provide water for families in four districts, and dry food rations for 400 vulnerable families.

- **Syria, £21,480**

BMS is providing sustained food aid to 200 families affected by the Syria crisis in and around Aleppo. The parcels, containing foodstuffs such as rice, sugar, milk and lentils, will be distributed for six months.

Hot Topic

Pray About Climate Change

How much are you aware of the causes and potential impacts of climate change on the world? How can we pray about these issues? In the month of another UN conference on the issue John Lockwood encourages us to engage with the debate.

Coming up over the next weeks and months are a series of international meetings about trying to limit increasing climate changes over the coming years. This is important because as Christians we are charged to care for the Lord's creation. Also climate changes mostly impact the poor and disadvantaged, people who are also God's children. Please pray about this extremely difficult problem, which is very briefly explained below.

Something happened around 1800 AD which left an imprint in both atmospheric composition and temperature not seen for at least the last 800,000 years and probably the last 24-26 million years. The last

time atmospheric carbon dioxide was at current levels was probably about 24-26 million years ago. This something was the Industrial Revolution. Much of western prosperity is fossil fuel based, and is thus responsible for increasing atmospheric carbon dioxide and global warming.

While the 2009 UNFCCC Conference of the Parties in Copenhagen failed to deliver any formal "climate deal", the non-binding Copenhagen Accord recognised the scientific view "that the increase in global temperature above preindustrial levels should be below 2 degrees celsius". The adoption of this target occurred despite increasing evidence that for at least some nations and ecosystems, the risk of severe impacts is already significant at 2°C. At the same time, the continued rise in greenhouse gas emissions in the past decade and the delays in a comprehensive global emissions reduction agreement have made achieving this target extremely difficult, arguably impossible, raising the likelihood of global temperature rises of 3°C or 4°C within this century.



Any temperature target implies a maximum amount of carbon that can be emitted into the atmosphere. The Intergovernmental panel on Climate Change recently identified the world's "carbon budget", the amount of carbon dioxide that can be emitted if there is to be a chance of averting the most dangerous of climate change impacts. The world is currently on track to spend the remainder of this budget in just three decades.

UN climate talks have been bogged down by arguments over who should do what to fix global warming

Since they began more than two decades ago, the UN climate talks have been bogged down by arguments between developed and developing countries over who should do what to fix global warming. The Green Climate Fund was created four years ago as a way to help

poorer countries cut their own greenhouse gas emissions to stem future climate change, as well as adapt to changes that are already happening. President Barack Obama will pledge \$3 billion to the Green Climate Fund. Other countries, including the United Kingdom, France, Germany, Sweden, the Netherlands, Mexico and South Korea, have already announced pledges to the fund, bringing the total amount committed to \$6 billion.

Other developed nations, such as Canada, Japan and Australia, still have not offered pledges. The countries party to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change had set an original target of getting \$10-15 billion pledged to the fund before the next negotiating meeting in Lima this month.

Please pray about these upcoming climate change negotiations.

From Italy with Love

Update from the MacFarlanes

For many years South Parade has had a link to BMS World Mission partners Ann and David MacFarlane working in the south of Italy. Recently they posted their last newsletter of the year.

What a wonderful year we have had so far and we praise God for you all and the part all of you, our partners in mission, have played. We have been with the majority of you for just over 21 years now and we have loved every minute of those years. We have never ever felt let down by you all and I really mean it when I say we could never had arrived at this landmark without you **Ann & David** all.

I want to take this opportunity and wish you all a very merry Christmas and a happy New Year. We are

coming to the end of this year with getting more and more involved with the problem Italy has with incoming immigrants from Africa. We have not been able to get to Rosarno yet as we have many of these young men arriving here in our port at Reggio and the city is full of them as they beg for money in order to get to Rosarno.

They make their way also to other places in the South and eventually



the North and on to places as far as Sweden and Norway. Places where there is some possibility of work.

They arrive without proper clothing and food and many do not even get here. Many are thrown overboard and recently there were photos on the internet of the many

bodies washed up on our coasts.

The first boat that arrived was from Syria with 1,601 men, women and

children. Those people were taken by buses to various parts of Italy. Ann was there along with other agencies and churches to give out clothing. They were picked up by the Italian authorities and brought into the port at Reggio.

Ann and the team said it was heart rending listening to the refugees' tragic stories. They felt privileged to have been able to help them.

Within a few days another boat with 250 Syrians was picked up and also brought into our port at Reggio. They had been adrift on a small boat for 10 days.

Among those who were saved from drowning were pregnant women, young families, and some young men. Ann with two members of our Action team were able to help a group of them with clothing and shoes and hot drinks and food. They had only the

clothes they had on having lost everything in the sea. Some had no shoes or a jacket. Ann and the two members of the team were saying that it was heart rending listening to the many tragic stories and all felt very privileged to have been able to help them.

Our food bank continues to diminish and in fact, this month there was no food at all apart from some local fruit. We continue with the help we are receiving from donations to give the families at least something.

Our church continues to grow numerically and spiritually and we praise God for the wonderful unity and family spirit that draws people to us. Every time we have had visitors, they have been overwhelmed

with the closeness of the fellowship and how open they are to receiving new people.

Prayer points:

- Praise God for the continual spiritual and numerical growth in the church.
- Praise Him for the new people that are coming especially as we have five new Italians, a Brazilian family and three to four Nigerians as well.

- Pray for Rosarno, the African and Syrian refugees, Lucia.
- The Food Bank. Our Action team. Isabelle, Stephen and Sam.
- For our young people who are having an Evangelistic Christmas concert.


Is the Bible Reliable?

One Saturday in October, emeritus Professor of Thermodynamics Andy Mackintosh gave a talk at Tinshill Free church, to talk about the fossil record and to consider what the evidence from science tells us about events in our ancient history.

The talk was very accessible to non-scientists and included many “hands-on” samples of fossils to touch and to study. Evidence was presented for various fossilised remains of giraffes, butterflies, dragonflies, elephants and crocodiles. The received wisdom in our Western culture asserts that these fossils date back millions of years and are part of an unbroken chain of evolutionary processes. Andy demonstrated that such fossils are identical to the modern day skeletons. There have been no material changes in the fossil record compared to the modern equivalent.

“What about the dinosaurs?” you may ask. Evidence was presented of fossilised remains in which a dinosaur was buried together with a crocodile. Once again, the crocodile bones are identical to those of modern day crocodiles and concluded that the same position can be adopted for the dinosaur bones.

Andy showed us fossils displaying intricate patterns of butterfly wings and fern leaves. He argued that the only way such delicate structures and colours could be imprinted in the rocks, is if it happened instantly (rather than layered over millions of years as many assert).



A recent discovery was also highlighted, in which soft tissue and meat has been found in the marrow of dinosaur bones. This is perhaps the most compelling evidence so far, that the bones cannot be 500 million years old; but that they date to a more recent period in history.

The overwhelming evidence from the rocks shows that a catastrophic event took place in history, in which most living creatures were buried instantly. (This event is often described as the “Cambrian explosion” and many geologists believe this took place 542 million years ago). Geologists cannot offer a definitive explanation as to the cause of this catastrophic event.

Do we look at a fossil and think of divine judgement?

The evidence from science directed us to the biblical record, in which Genesis describes a global flood which caused the rapid death of almost all living creatures. This was a direct response by God, as a judgement upon the sin of the hu-

man race. The only place of safety could be found in the ark. The text suggests that this was a far more recent event than 500 million years ago.

Andy concluded by encouraging us to look at fossils in a new way: will we look at a fossil and consider its formation millions of years ago before humanity was on earth... or will we think of divine judgement?

The New Testament speaks of another future global judgement (by fire) to come. The only place of safety today can be found at The Cross. Will you be safe in Jesus when that day comes...?

The Crypt at Christmas

Headingley member Arja Copperwheat works as a Community Fundraiser for St George's Crypt. She says that as she goes and speaks about the work of the charity to groups of people at schools, churches, Women's Institutes, Rotary Clubs, Corporates and many others the comment she hears most often after a talk is "I didn't know the Crypt did all that".

Most people think the Crypt is a soup kitchen providing food for homeless people, mainly for old men. When I tell them that the average age of the people staying with us in our bedrooms is 24, they are taken aback. St George's Crypt is – has to be – so much more than a soup kitchen. Beyond catering for their immediate physical needs, we have a commitment to helping the people

we serve out of their situation, and into employment and permanent accommodation.

Our first response to anyone coming through our doors is to provide food and drink. Then we offer showers, clean clothes and beds. We have 15 bedrooms and 12 extra beds in dormitory rooms. (This goes up to 37 beds in total during the cold weather - last year we provided bed spaces for 1,028 different people.) While people are with us, we try to ascertain how we can help them get out of the situation they are in.

Most people who come to us from living on the streets feel depressed and hopeless, so one of our main aims is to build up their self-confidence. This is done through our training and engagement programme. Throughout the week we have a lot of activities going on: drama and

singing with Opera North and Urban Sprawl Theatre Company; cooking and art classes; physiotherapy sessions and many more. We also offer opportunities for our clients to work throughout our organisation: working in our shops; working for our catering company Nurture in our kitchen and our four cafés; working in our gardens; going out with the van. This not only gives them the opportunity to learn new skills, but also enables them to take NVQ qualifications and builds up their self-esteem.

Many clients have found employment at the Crypt and many others have been helped into employment elsewhere. We also, with support from Leeds City Council, help to find suitable permanent accommodation for our clients, with an 85% success rate in “moving them on”. When the clients have got their own accommodation, they are able to join our floating support programme which supports them until they feel they can manage on their own.

As well as this important work, the Crypt also works together with the NHS to house people in our bedrooms who have been discharged from hospital and would otherwise be homeless. They often still need medical care, which is offered by nurses who come and see them regularly.

Every Sunday morning Roger Quick, our Chaplain, holds a church service in the Crypt called the Lighthouse, with an average attendance of about 45 people. This is a church which accepts, welcomes and supports the socially excluded.

For many years now, the collection on Christmas Day at South Parade has been held for St George's Crypt, and on behalf of the Crypt I want to thank everyone at South Parade for their generosity, support and prayers. It is much appreciated.

This Christmas Day, a live service is being broadcast on the BBC from St George's Church. During the morning, the cameras will be coming down to the Crypt, where the staff will be preparing Christmas Dinner for about 150 clients. We would appreciate your prayers for that service, as it is a wonderful opportunity to show people a glimpse of God's work amongst the homeless of Leeds, carried out faithfully at St George's Crypt for the last 84 years.

Ford's Focus

Gilgal: What's in a Name?

Steve Ford continues his study of the word “Gilgal” in the Old Testament, and challenges us to remember God’s salvation in our lives, to see Gilgal not just as a physical place, but a marker of our security in God’s faithfulness. In the final part of the study Steve shows us that it is possible to abuse that memorial place and lose all that has been secured by the grace of God.

The Abuse of Gilgal (1 Samuel 11.14)

Samuel encourages the people of Israel in 1 Samuel 11.14 to return to Gilgal and to renew the kingdom there. The place of the

new beginning, the place of commitment, the place of security. We know when we read this passage that there was repentance in the form of sacrifices and there was great rejoicing, something that can only come at the place of security.

It wasn't long before this place of safety and security was abused. We can read the story in 1 Samuel 13.

Essentially power goes to Saul's head, whether it was of his own doing or out of fear or just because he thought he was doing the right thing is not really important. What is important though is that Saul rushed into something that he should not have done. He commands that a sacrifice be offered before the right time and he assumes that he, as king, has authority to offer it when in fact it was reserved for the “man of God”. He abused his position as king because he saw everything around him falling apart. How many times have we done that - rushed in to try to rescue a situation when really what we should do is reconvene, pray and wait for God's time?



It was in that reckless moment that all that Saul had been entrusted with was lost. God needs people who will seek him for who he is, seeking first his kingdom and his righteousness. When we do that, God's blessing will follow. In two short years as king of Israel Saul had managed to alienate his people. He went from 3,000 fighting men to just 600. His subjects were so scared and fearful of the enemy that they resorted to hiding in caves, in bushes, among rocks, in holes and in pits. From this moment on Saul was on his own mission and not on God's mission. Let us remember the security, the cost and the freedom of Gilgal and seek to walk in God's way and not our own so that we do not fall foul of the possible abuse of Gilgal.



The Separation of Gilgal (Hosea 9.15 and Hosea 12.11)

This shows the consequences of what happens if we abuse the freedom God has given us. We become worthless and our altars (memorials) become just a heap of rubble with no meaning.

Paul writes to the Galatian church (Galatians 5.13) and advises them not to use their new found liberty

in Christ as an excuse for self gain or selfish ends.

We read in Hosea that God was so abhorred at the Jews' behaviour, lack of trust and failure to seek Him that in Hosea 9.15 he says that "all their wickedness is in Gilgal" and "I will drive them from my house". This is a sorry state of affairs that a people who were rescued by God's grace and subsequently kept by his mercy were still able to reject and drive him to distraction. In Hosea 12:11 God says that the very memorials that have been placed in Gilgal will be heaps of rubble, just turned over and forgotten. Oh that we learn not to forsake the Lord our God but that we learn to continue in the freedom of Gilgal, not abusing that freedom which leads to the separation and destruction of the very memorial we first set up and talked about.

Is this the end or is there security to be found in Gilgal?

The Security of Gilgal (2 Kings 2.1)

We have seen that Gilgal is a place of rolling away, memorial, cost, freedom, abuse and separation.

What we also find is that Gilgal is a place of security. We all need places of security, places where we know God is, and where He has intervened in our lives.

In 2 Kings 2.1 Elisha had found the place of security with God and was prepared to go with Elijah and witness his grand departure into heaven.

Like Elijah we will be able to draw from the well of salvation and go out and accomplish great things for God

The security of Gilgal is something that we all must find but there is no easy way or short cut to finding it. We have to go through the process of laying down our memorial stones, our marker for all to see. We will experience the cost of Gilgal together with the freedom that can be found in Gilgal. I guess at times we will even abuse the freedom found and may also experience the wrath of God and the separation that comes because we do not fear the holiness of God as we should.

The great thing is that even in situations like this God can and will, if we are willing, bring us back to Gilgal to the place of memorial which becomes our place of security. We, like Elijah, will be able to draw from the well of salvation the freedom that is found in such a place and be able to know that we can go out again and accomplish great things for God. The security of Gilgal gives us knowledge and we, with Elisha, will be able to say “yes I know; keep silent” (2 Kings 2.3)

- Have we found our Gilgal?
- Have we established our memorial?
- Have we tasted of the bounty of God’s provision or are we still looking for manna in the wilderness?

I trust and pray that you will know God and His wonderful provisions for life. I also pray that we may guard against any abuse of freedom which leads to separation. If you are separated then I pray that you will be able to find the place of security and re-establish a relationship that will bless and encourage others.


