Out of the Boat

Whilst sitting in a dinghy in the Sanctuary at Headingley in the middle of the night during October 2017's prayer week (after having climbed in to pray, without any plan of how I was going to get out again with a semblance of my dignity intact) I felt God show me a picture in my mind of the whole room full of people all praying at once, alive with the spirit.



Fast forward to January's South Parade Together service and there we were, starting on something adventurous, all praying together, separately in little groups of twos or threes, but as one body. Interestingly, I had had a completely different plan of how Prayer Time would look when I'd thought about the service. In fact

a long time back when the Elders and Ministry Team first met to pray and discuss the vision for South Parade and adventure was mentioned, I'd thought that's lovely and something I will enjoy hearing about.

I'm someone who drives her family mad by having to be coaxed into watching new television programmes, as they're new and there's no guarantee that I will like them. And going on holiday is less of a joy and more of a list inducing

So get in your dinghy, fear not about the exit strategy as dignity is not necessarily a prerequisite of following Christ (thank goodness) and be ready for God to say his time is now.

Headingley

A reminder of the Headingley MC 5 year goal (approximately 16 months gone!) – In 5 years, Headingley Morning Mission Community will be a vibrant, growing church, engaged in faithful worship and mission locally and abroad, made up of all ages and nationalities, being supportive and committed to each other

There has recently been increased activity relating to the “international” aspect of our goal, with a fairly healthy representation from across South Parade at Transformations Leeds’ multi-seminar event on 6 January, helping the church to reach out to visiting internationals. The following



Saturday saw South Parade hosting an afternoon of entertainment and information, with 15 partners in mission being available to encourage the church in a number of mission areas (see page 7).

Is it coincidental that the Spring 2018 issue of *Baptists Together* magazine has the theme, “Many cultures, one church”? One article says: “Multi-ethnic churches are those where different ethnicities co-exist, with one culture – often, white British – being the modus operandi. The journey from multi-ethnic to multicultural can be richly rewarding as God’s people together journey into his plans and purposes.” Might the same be true of different age-related cultures across the mission community, with the modus operandi being fairly middle aged?

Whilst there is a social aspect to church life, we are not a social club and there is deeper significance in how we engage with each other and the community around us. Nathan Shipley and Dave Horsfall spoke very powerfully on 21 January about vulnerability and its appropriate place in our relationships. It doesn’t take much searching to see that vulnerability is common to the four areas of Prayer, Adventure, Growth and Encouragement that South Parade has had as focus points over

the past year, and they have continued to shape the discussions in Leadership Team meetings.

The Leadership Team would like to take this opportunity to encourage the Headingley MC, from right across the spectrum of the congregation, to engage with the Mission Community meetings. The next one is planned for Thursday 15 February. The agenda items include:

- Alternative expressions is an initiative to engage with people for whom traditional church attendance is not something that they would countenance. What activities can Headingley MC organise, who would be interested in being involved and what timescales can we put in place?
- Youth group is something that is notably absent from the Headingley MC (South Parade at large) programme of activities. Why is this and what can be done to rectify the situation?
- Easter services are an opportunity to evangelise in the

local community at such a significant marker in the Christian calendar. What should we be doing and when?

- Finances as part of South Parade at large require particular focus and prayerful consideration.
- Shared lunches (international students) – Hospitality, sharing food and spending time together were recurring themes in the seminars at the Transformations Leeds event on 6 January. Bring and share lunches have been going on at Headingley for quite a while, with varying degrees of attendance. How could the whole mission community benefit from a change of focus for these events?


Where have you seen God working?

Alastair Corson

1916 - 2018

It is with great sadness that we record the death at the wonderful age of 101 of Alastair Corson, a former Church Secretary of South Parade.

Alastair combined a quiet authority with a depth of spiritual experience. He was a most gracious and wise father figure to many in the church (when I was a young upstart in the church leadership!) He was Church Secretary from 1971-1986, a crucial period in the church evolving its strongly evangelical stance. This was a time when the Church Secretary always gave the notices at both services and Alastair made endearing gaffes, most memorably when he announced a fundraising event for the “blind dogs for the guides”! After standing down from the leadership he remained a key figure in the church and was still always available for advice when this was sought.

Alastair’s mother was brought up at South Parade, but joined the Brethren on her marriage. He himself was converted through the Crusaders, and was baptized whilst serving

in the army in Shilong in Assam in 1944 in a stream which had been specially dammed during the monsoon season to make this possible!

On returning home he eventually joined Hunslet Baptist Tabernacle where he later served as a deacon. He married Evelyn, and their two eldest sons attended the Sunday School at South Parade. When a third son was born they decided to join South Parade in 1961. Alastair, as Church Secretary with Raymond Newton as Treasurer, helped to guide the church during a period of change. He always took great delight in his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren.


At the age of 100 he was expressing concern at how few opportunities he got to witness to his fellow residents

After a long marriage Evelyn sadly died, but Alastair remarried. Pauline also passed away and Alastair then

married Elizabeth who lives in Keswick. After a fall Alastair began to need a greater degree of care and moved into a care home. However, he retained his mental faculties fully and was always interested to hear news of our family and the church at South Parade. When Margaret and I last visited him in July 2017 we were able to enjoy a deep time of

sharing and praying together even though a slight stroke had slowed his speech. He was even expressing concern at how few opportunities he got to witness to his fellow residents! We will always remember him with deep gratitude to God.

Training French Pastors

French Evangelical Seminary

Mike and Liz James were sent by the church in 1974 as missionaries to France, and still keep an eye on what's going on in Leeds. They recently sent *Intouch* news of a new project that needs our prayer and support.

Greetings from the James' in Elancourt, France, a suburban town on the west side of Paris. Liz and I moved here in 1995 after spending over 20 years on the east side of Paris. It seems an age since we left South Parade – 1974 is a long time ago! We left with two young children and now have four adult children and six grandchildren.

We very much enjoy reading news of South Parade in the *Intouch* magazine. Thank you to those who have sent it faithfully all these years. When we came to France in 1974, we soon realised that we were, effectively, “Tentmaker missionaries.” We have been involved in the development of

several churches and church ministries. We are currently working with a French Evangelical Seminary, situated at Vaux-sur-Seine, North-West of Paris. Mike has just stepped down from the role of Finance Director and is focusing on raising money for a new library project for the seminary. Your prayers as well as any gifts would be very welcome.

Because of the increased need for training of future leaders of the church in France and the French-speaking world, the Seminary is seeking to increase the number of students it trains by 50%

The formal, French name of the seminary is the Faculté Libre de Théologie Evangélique (FLTE). It is a solidly-evangelical, university-level institution set up in 1965. The

Seminary offers an undergraduate degree (three years), Masters (two years) and Doctorate (three to five years). It has 147 students plus an additional 140 distance-learning students. It reaches students from all French speaking countries in Europe, as well as from French-speaking Africa, and from French West Indies.

The growth of Protestant evangelical churches in France is impressive, despite nearly half of the population professing “no religion” and a growing Muslim presence. In France, the number of French evangelicals has grown over ten-fold during the past 60 years, from 50,000 in 1950 to 650,000 in 2017. In addition, 1,299 churches have been created since 1970, a new church every 10 days, most of which have limited resources. The FLTE plays important roles in the growth of the French church by providing solid, Biblical theological education to steward the growth

and by strengthening evangelical unity.

Former students hold teaching positions in other teaching institutions in French-speaking Europe and also have an important role in the leadership of different French evangelical denominations. Others have become leaders of the African Churches, IFES general secretaries, or founders of the main evangelical theological seminaries of French-speaking Africa.

Because of the increased need for training of pastors and future leaders of the church in France and the French-speaking world, the French Seminary at Vaux-sur-Seine is seeking to increase by 50% the number of students it trains. A key element of providing robust and solid theological education is having access to a fully equipped library with a wide variety of publications and other media to encapsulate the fullness of theological thought and history. In its present state, however, the existing FLTE library no longer meets the needs of this growing student body because it is at capacity, with only 10,000 volumes readily accessible and insufficient workstations for all who wish to study.

New Library Project

The seminary has, therefore, a new library project with plans for 25,000 titles to be readily accessible and to provide a larger number of workstations. It would also house study rooms, furnished with state-of-the-art computer equipment, a media room, a research centre, and archival space for French-speaking evangelical churches, thus enabling it to become a research centre for doctoral and post-doctoral students from the entire French-speaking world.

Partnerships already exist with the Langham Foundation, UK, and with African French-speaking seminaries.



In addition to providing a state-of-the-art library, the project will also resolve accessibility problems which have to be taken into account, for legal reasons. It is estimated that the new library will cost approximately 3 million euros to build, of which gifts or pledges of 500,000 euros have already been obtained.





Creating Worship Spaces

The Cross at Headingley

I wonder how many of you notice the little cross that sits above the pulpit at Headingley? Or know how it came to be there?

When David Rigden Green was called to be the minister of South Parade in 1961 he noticed that there was no cross anywhere in the sanctuary. So he placed the little cross where it still stands today – discreet but significant. When he died in 1978, just before retiring, Joyce, his wife, added an inscription.

Where had the cross come from? In 1941 David was newly ordained as a Baptist minister in Oxford. Many young men of his generation were being called up for the war. David had taken a pacifist stance, but was grappling with it. At that time he was engaged to a young nurse, Joyce Wenger, who had trained at the Radcliffe in Oxford. He obviously shared his struggle with her, as some of Joyce's correspondence from that time shows.

On 9 September 1941 Joyce wrote: *"I am glad that although you feel that pacifism is the right thing, you do feel that we are all in this mess and must pull our weight, whether our principles are against it or not... Proud as I am of you already in your desire to stand by your convictions, I think I should be, if it were possible, even more proud of you if you felt you could put them to one side, because I know how terribly much it would cost you to do so, in other people's eyes as well as your own... A padre's job will be excellent experience..."*

He carried that little wooden cross and where it was placed became a place of worship in the midst of hardship and pain.

On 14 September 1941 Joyce wrote: *"...so don't just cross out 'chaplaincy' from your list of possibilities just because the prospect fills you with trepidation, but remember that you may find your own trembling and fearfulness turned into*

strength because instead of being over yourself, it is for others – trembling, not of fear but of eagerness to help them, and fearfulness, not because you will fail but that you may not be able to help them in time... I do feel that remaining in church... you will be putting yourself into a backwater. People at home now... with husbands, sweethearts or sons abroad in the forces mostly in dangerous places need someone who has

experienced the major gamut of human passions, particularly separation and bereavement, to steady and help them. That is where you and I fail. Our experience is only in our imaginations and so we're not yet fitted to give the spiritual help needed. We are too young in experience. Were it not wartime, this lack of experience wouldn't be so evident because it wouldn't be needed quite so universally. You would be much better caring for young men, for you know a young man's temptations, and you will find, I am sure, that in helping them you are helping yourself..."

David joined the RAF as a Padre, serving in Belgium and Denmark. He was one of the first "official visitors" into the Belsen concentration camp when it was liberated, leaving some

unhappy, vivid memories and photographs which were discovered in his safe after his death.

As Padre, David help impromptu services wherever the men were: in a field, in the woods, by a river. He carried that little wooden cross and where it was placed became for him and the men he was serving, a place of worship in the midst of hardship and pain. So that cross travelled around Europe with David, creating a worship-space wherever it was placed, reminding people to turn to God, particularly in the midst of war and difficulty.

Ford's Focus

John's Gospel Part 17: A Commitment and a Betrayal

John 13

In this chapter we have an account of both commitment to and betrayal of Jesus, an account that demonstrates to us today the seriousness of what the cost of discipleship really means.

Our story starts around a meal table, a place where conversation takes place. Jesus is celebrating with his disciples a meal we have come to know as the Last Supper. It is in this place of closeness with his disciples, those he had chosen to be with him on his three years of extraordinary ministry, that we encounter the man Jesus, demonstrating what true Christianity is all about.



The narrative tells us in verse 3 that Jesus knew “that the Father had given him all authority” and “that his time had come to return to His Father.” With this knowledge of what was ahead Jesus rises from his place at the table, takes a towel and a bowl of water and proceeds to wash his disciples’ feet. This act is demonstrating that Christianity is about service not ritual. He is also showing that for any one of us to be able to partake of the “Kingdom of Heaven” we need the experience of washing by the hands and life of Jesus so we can be presented to the Father, spotless, by and in the person of Jesus Christ.

Peter protests at this demonstration of servanthood that Jesus is modelling and the narrative gives the impression that Peter was too proud and too full of self importance to allow this man, who he had come to know and revere as friend and Lord, to stoop so low as to wash his feet, a job that would have been the task of an employed servant in an established Jewish/Roman household of the time.

Jesus's response to Peter's attitude was "you don't understand now, but someday you will" and "if you don't allow me to perform this act of service on you then you have no part with me." At this point in the proceedings Peter has a light-bulb moment where he demonstrates and reveals his ignorance to the whole situation and says "well not just my feet then, wash all of me."

The truth is that we are all clean through the word already spoken (as we will discover in John 15.3 later) but we need to be in a place of submission where we allow our feet, the area that is symbolically in contact with the world, to be washed in order for us to continue to live in this great freedom we call salvation.

It is true to say that everyone of us has the potential to betray, and as we know even Peter, who has just made a scene over the demonstration of servanthood, would betray Jesus in the not too distant future.

Judas was a man chosen by Jesus to be part of the twelve men that he called disciples. He was a man who

obviously showed promise, rising to the rank of treasurer, a role that gave him authority, respect and responsibility. This raises questions around how Judas had aspired to the role, was he naturally good with money? Was he a manipulator working to hold some kind of power? Was he a control freak? Did he have a heart of compassion for the poor and therefore was naively entrusted with the money?

Whatever the reason for Jesus choosing Judas will remain a mystery except for the fact that Judas was chosen to betray

Jesus, it was God's plan, which again raises questions around who God chooses and who betrays Him.

The truth is God does not choose people to betray Him. We all have the potential to do that ourselves and we are all vulnerable when we lose focus of, or stray from Christ himself.

We have here in John 13 the ultimate betrayal, that of a man's life for approximately half a year's wages equivalent. Betrayal is the act of being unfaithful and in our case, as Christians, that is being unfaithful to



Christ and his in-dwelling life within us.

Here are words that should drive us to our knees in acknowledgement that this man Jesus is without any doubt God

What John is recording here in this chapter is that Jesus had called Judas out, He had shown him up for who he was, a liar and a cheat. The reality is that Judas had already strayed in his heart and head, the act had already been committed, Jesus just says “Go and do and do quietly”. Jesus knew God’s plan and no longer needed to or wanted to procrastinate the unfolding plan of salvation.

We read in verses 31-35 words that should drive us to our knees in acknowledgement that this man Jesus is without any doubt God. What Jesus was saying was “now my Father’s work and my work is complete, from now on you will need to support yourselves”. Jesus says follow my example of love to you and extend this among yourselves so all those around you will

know you are my disciples.

Then we read the well known exclamation of exuberance by Peter, who is not unlike many of us, who rushes in where angels fear to tread. Peter utters words that no man or woman can fulfil without the indwelling, ongoing work of the “Helper”, the Holy Spirit, promised by Jesus in chapter 14.

I have said many times before in different writings that salvation is worked out daily. The truth is that none of us can utter Peter’s words in verse 37 “Lord why can I not follow you now? I will lay down my life for your sake” and ever hope to fulfil them without us living a life in and through the power of the Holy Spirit.

As Jesus demonstrated through His life on earth, “laying down our life” involves us willing giving up all rights to our life and accepting that a life lived in God is first and foremost spiritual, which works out salvation in and through our circumstances and therefore glorifies God and makes Him known.

Money Matters

2018 Church Budget

Church Treasurer Katharine Widdowson answers questions about the 2018 budget for the church and challenges us all to respond.

What does it cost to run South Parade?

£1,244 a day last year - see below.

How much does a minister cost?

Minimum annual stipend	£22,750
Manse	£ 8,476
Employer's NI	£ 2,012
Employer's Pension	£ 2,601
TOTAL	£35,839

What do we pay towards the Baptist Pension scheme deficit?

The final salary scheme for ministers is now closed to accrual. The

deficit on the BPS at 31 December 2017 is £139m. The recovery plan should end June 2035. We pay £9,062 into this hole every year in deficiency payments. Should we ever not be employing a minister, our own pension liability would be £475,200.

How much do we give away?

In 2017 we gave away £57,587 (15% of our income). The 2018 budget is for donations of £50,140 (13% of income).

How much of our spending do the members pay for?

Everything! We have some reserves so for a short period we can continue to pay the running costs while income is less than expenses.

What it costs to run South Parade

What other income is there?

- Gift Aid. If you pay tax, complete a Gift Aid Declaration and give us identifiable income (standing orders, cheques or envelopes) and we can claim 25% of your donations from HMRC. About £64,000 in 2017
- Rental income £25,000 in 2017
- Listed Places of Worship VAT scheme – we can recover the VAT on repairs to Headingley or Cragg. £17,500 in 2017

How many members/regular attenders does SP have?

We wish we knew! There are clearly more “members” on the list than are active. There are also many regular attenders who are not members and may not be on the list.

How many identifiable givers?

152 in 2017, some of whom give on behalf of couples, so these represent 214 members/regular attenders. There were 164 givers in 2016. But some of these died in 2017, moved away, retired, met financial difficulties or left SP. There were 5 new givers in 2017.

Should we stop any activities?

What’s your answer to this question?

Increasing income

Clearly a deficit budget every year is not sustainable. As noted earlier, not everyone gives, and some people have not changed their giving for many years. The Elders and Deacons are planning a campaign to encourage all members and regular attenders to re-view their giving and pledge what they will give per year for the next 3 years.

Our suggestion is that everyone increases giving by £10 per month. If 240 members give an extra £10 per month, plus gift aid, income will increase by £36,000.

Those who currently put a few pence in the offertory bag will be encouraged to use envelopes or set up a standing order. We will launch this appeal in February. If after 6 months income is not increasing, we will cut the expenditure to stay within income.



A recommendation of a book and a film by South Parade members Tim Jackson and Richard Sykes.



You Can Change by Tim Chester

I do not like the pictures on the front of *You Can Change*. Before reading it, I was not particularly convinced by its title either. But

my experience has proved that there is wisdom in the old adage “Never judge a book by its cover”.

You Can Change is a book that offers hope for change. It aims for this, not solely on its own merits, but by pointing to Jesus and explaining how faith in Him leads to change.

The book has reminded me of the wonderful truths of knowing and following Jesus

It has been a challenging, but helpful and encouraging read, as it achieves this task. I have gained greater awareness and understanding of sinful behaviour and negative emotions in my life. However, it has reminded me of the wonderful truths of knowing and following Jesus, and how they really are greater than the sinful desires which tempt me.

The title of each chapter is a question, digging deeper into motiva-



tions and methods for change. The key chapters in the middle of the book, reflect on “What truths do you need to turn to?” and “What desires do you need to turn from?” These questions highlight a great feature of the book, in that it is very practical and applicable, with reflection exercises and questions for discussion throughout.

Having discussed these questions with a fellow Relay Worker and our supervisor, I would strongly recommend that the book is read alongside a good friend, with whom the questions can be honestly discussed with a view to mutually growing in godly character.

It has been a formative book, which I am really glad to have read, especially given my initial reservations!

I bought this on DVD just after Easter last year, not having heard anything about it previously.

The premise of the film starts at the crucifixion, with Roman Tribune Clavius (Joseph Fiennes) sent by Pontius Pilate (Peter Firth) to make sure that Jesus (correctly pronounced Yeshua, played by Cliff Curtis) is actually killed. When the reports come through that he is risen / his body has been stolen Clavius has the task of quashing the rumours and has to find the missing corpse.

The depiction of first century Middle Eastern cultures and characters was a refreshing and challenging experience

Daniel (then aged 13) and I watched the film together and agreed that the atmosphere felt realistic, certainly for me remembering the biblical epics of the 60s and 70s! Joseph Fiennes is a fine actor and shows a great deal of conviction in the role. In interviews about the film, he talks about his faith and how it and the role impacted on each other.

Inevitably, there are character details within the cast that raise question marks, notably that Mary Mag-

dalene is portrayed as a “woman of the night”, when I believe it is fairly universally accepted that this idea hangs a lot of conclusion on very little evidence and is therefore unlikely.

Other reviews of this film on the internet are not at all complimentary. *The Guardian* in particular only liked a small section of the action. Perhaps to be a professional critic you watch things from a technical or detached perspective. At the risk of coming across as naive, I like to be drawn in to a film and found that the depiction of first century Middle Eastern cultures and characters of whom I have read so much was quite a refreshing and challenging experience.

There is no reason that *Risen* should not stand up in comparison to mainstream cinematic offerings. Sony Pictures produced it and amongst Kevin Reynolds’ other credits you’ll find *Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves*, *The Count of Monte Cristo* and *Waterworld*.

I happened upon my copy in a charity shop and gave just a pound or two. A more intentional purchase online will cost around £5. Easter is coming early this year (Sunday 1 April). What about a double bill of *The Passion* on Good Friday and *Risen* on Monday? More wholesome food for thought than half a dozen chocolate eggs – It’s the reason for the season!


