Change From the Inside Out

As we approach Pentecost we celebrate the pouring out of the Holy Spirit in a new and fresh way on God's people (Acts 2). This is an exciting time of the year for us as we praise God for this gracious gift and resolve once more to depend on the power of the Spirit in all we do.

do believe these are exciting times for us as a church, not just because it's Pentecost



but because we are moving forward together. We have made some changes to our structure so we are "one church, three sites, many

gatherings". We have adopted

a new purpose statement, "Passion for God, love for people, heart for mission". And we are working on some values together, currently expressed as "following Jesus, the centrality of the Bible,

engaging in mission, embracing adventure and faithful in prayer".

We look forward to welcoming Matt Wright when he joins us

Personnel wise, we have called a new minister, Matt Wright, who will be inducted as a pastor of South Parade on Saturday 20 July. He will lead on mission to Headingley, have a role in children's and family ministry, and head up our small group work. We look forward to welcoming Matt and his wife Rachel when they join us.

The changes we're making are with the aim of seeing lives transformed for Jesus. We long and pray for more.

We also have two full-time interns, Hannah Childs and Gideon Fairhall, starting in June. We hope that an internship programme will be something we run on a regular basis year on year and are excited to see how this will unfold.

A longside these changes we are developing our work on the ground. The Connect Partnership Agreement is now in place and we have seen some hugely positive evenings for Rooted, which we hope to launch as a fullyfledged Gathering of South Parade this summer.

There were two baptisms at Cragg on Easter Sunday and we are beginning baptismal classes in June at Headingley. Conversions and baptisms are especially encouraging. All the changes we make are with the aim of seeing lives transformed for Jesus. We long and pray for more. We will only continue to move forward if we do so together. I discern that two things are especially important at the moment.

Firstly, we need to develop a culture of service across the life of the church. So many are serving already, and it's great to see. Thank you for all you do! And of course, we recognise that people are following lesus in the workplace, the home and the wider community as we seek to be whole-life disciples. This is vital but serving in the gathered church as we are able is important as well. Because of this we're having a special Sunday on 23 lune where we share the opportunities available and encourage people to sign up. There will be more information on this in coming weeks.

The second thing we need is, of course, God's Spirit. Which brings us back to Pentecost. The Holy Spirit made all the difference in the world to the first disciples. They were empowered and emboldened to live and proclaim the good news of Jesus. It was still tough for them. They had to deal with much opposition and regular disappointment. But, through God's transforming Spirit, they were able to engage in God's work God's way. As a result, the first-century world was turned upside down.

The same power is available to us. It's exciting to read about and celebrate Pentecost. It's even more exciting to experience God's power in our own lives, changing us from the inside out for ministry and mission.

May God work in us and enable us to touch many others with his amazing love in this new chapter of our life together.

BMS World News

Mozambique: The relief response begins

The Cyclone Idai relief response has begun. But Mozambique still needs your prayers and support.

fter our initial call for prayer and support, BMS World Mission supporters donated over £50,000 towards relief efforts in Mozambique. Thank you so much for your generosity. You've helped us kickstart the relief response in Beira. But since a second cyclone hit Northern Mozam-

bique in late April, people are still in desperate need.

"I have conveyed your prayers, support and encouragement to all those I've met from the Baptist Convention of Mozambique (CBM) and they have been extremely grateful to know the world is standing with them," says Rachel Conway-Doel, BMS Relief Facilitator.

Rachel flew to Beira in March to help CBM assess the need created

by Cyclone Idai: 200,000 homes had been destroyed, and over 1,000 cases of cholera had been recorded, with at least two reported deaths. Cholera vaccination programmes have since begun across cities in Mozambique, with over 900,000 vaccines being shipped to Beira alone. Mosquito nets have also been provided to many people, to help

combat a rise in malaria cases.



BMS' long-term relief response in Beira will take the form of reconstruction of infrastructure, agricultural recovery and legal education support. As the devastation caused by Cyclones

Idai and Kenneth inevitably shifts out of the media spotlight, we know you won't forget about the people of Mozambique. Please continue to pray and give, so people there can rebuild their lives.

"I have lived nearly 30 years in Beira and have never seen anything like this," says BMS worker Carlos Tique Jone, who was in Beira when Cyclone Idai struck. He and his family are safe, and he is working with CBM to help facilitate the Christian relief response.



From the Treasurer's Computer

By the time you read this, the three church meetings planned for Thursday 23 May will have become a distant memory. As I write, however, I have prepared a PowerPoint for one and am about to prepare for the others.

irst will be the **Annual General Meeting** of members (the AGM). This is an annual opportunity provided by the constitution to look back at the previous calendar year as presented by the Annual Report and Accounts. This 22 page document is prepared in compliance with legislation and Fi-

nancial Reporting Standards relating to charities. The intention is to report to trustees, funders, potential donors, beneficiaries, employees, volunteers and any other interested parties, including the Charity Commission, what South Parade Baptist Church did in 2018, its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities. It is not, to be honest, light reading.

The Annual Report has been written by the Church Secretary, Charles Fletcher, and the Accounts prepared by me as Church Treasurer. The whole document is then examined by Garbutt & Elliott to check the church kept reasonable accounting records, the accounts are fairly prepared from the accounting records, the accounts disclose the many and varied bits of information charity accounts have to disclose, and that the Annual Report does not contradict the view shown by the accounts. The accounts are not audited, because only charities with income over £1m need an audit, so the Garbutt & Elliott report does not say the

accounts are right, only that they have not discovered anything which shows the accounts are wrong.

The Annual Report and Accounts were approved by the Elders and will be presented to the AGM for information. At the AGM I hope to explain a few points about pages 9 and 10, the SOFA and Balance Sheet, and answer questions from anyone who has read the accounts. We will file them at the Charity Commission and send a copy to our insurers, the Baptist Pension Scheme and possibly the bank.

he second meeting is a **Special Church Meeting** to consider the purchase of a manse for the use of Matt and Rachel Wright. Our constitution requires any property matters to be agreed by a Special Church Meeting. The Accounts page 10 show that we have sufficient money in the bank to spend £200-£220k on a manse. You may recall however that when the budget for 2019 was prepared, we looked ahead to the next three years to see if we would be able to continue to

pay for a second minister in 2022. The conclusion was that we could if giving increased every year by 10% to 15%, and if giving did not increase we could use our reserves.

If we spend our reserves on a manse, we will save the rent included in the budget, but we will lose the bank interest. The main issue is that the reserves will be so much lower that giving will **have** to increase by 10% to 15% pa because we will not have the reserves to fall back on. You will know by now what was decided.

The final **normal church meeting** will probably be shorter than usual. The main piece of business is the agreement between South Parade and the Salvation Army putting Connect on a formal footing. The Church Treasurer may comment on the financial picture four months into 2019; it is looking good – income is on budget and expenditure is so far below budget.

Parables for Today

Sumo Wrestling and the Book of Colossians

Sumo wrestling is a Japanese form of wrestling that challenges many aspects of Christian discipleship. Here are some of the reasons why I could never become a rikishi (sumo wrestler).

irstly I am not fat enough. Good friends tell me that I am potbellied but you have to be gargantuan and weigh about 400 pounds to be a proper sumo wrestler. Secondly I am not good at wrestling. At school my mate Otto Chan easily beat me in a wrestling bout when I was I4. Thirdly I went



to an independent school in Hertfordshire where sumo wrestling was never mentioned.

Fourthly, and most importantly, sumo is infused with the Shinto faith which is focused on the appeasement of the "kami". The best English translation of kami is spirits and the Shinto tradition declares that there are eight million kami. There are river gods, mountain gods and even boil and smallpox deities. Shinto unfolded as a religion to appease and propitiate the spirits in order to ensure bountiful harvests and divine protection.

For the Shinto faithful, the Japanese emperor was worshipped because he is descended from Amaterasu, the goddess of the sun. In the Shinto faith it is believed that when people die tragically, they might spitefully cause harm in the real world. To mitigate this, these unhappy spirits are worshipped as gods. Deceased Japanese heroes can also be worshipped.



There is also a dark side to the Shinto faith that is seldom mentioned human sacrifice. In 323 AD, there was serious flooding in Japan and the emperor Nintoku had a divine revelation in a dream that there was a man named Kowakubi who should be sacrificed to the river god. Kowakubi was subsequently thrown into the Kitakawa river and the flooding stopped.

umo wrestlers are required to follow the Shinto faith. They spend several minutes before a match lifting their legs high in the air and stomping them down in a vigorous and dramatic manner. They also throw salt into the fighting ring as a Shinto ritual. This faith in stomping and salt is believed to purify the fighting zone and to drive away evil spirits. In addition to this sumo wrestlers, as part of Shinto rituals, deliberately make babies cry in order to ward off evil spirits. Granted violence isn't used but Shinto referees wearing terrifying masks

glare at the infants if they refuse to sob.

As a Christian I refuse to put my faith in the magical powers of salt, stomping and screaming babies. Colossians 2.15 tells us this: "And having disarmed the powers and authorities, he made a

public spectacle of them, triumphing over them by the cross."

I have no desire to appease and placate false gods and worthless idols. Jesus died for me. He has forgiven all my sins.

It is Christ who, by his death, has conquered evil spirits and it seems foolish to trust in salt, stomping or screaming babies to defeat the powers of darkness. I am fully aware that many Buddhists, Shintoists and diverse pagans and heathens believe that throwing salt over your shoulder can defeat the powers of darkness

but I do not share this faith. I apologise if this sounds bigot-

ed and intolerant but I have no desire to appease and placate false gods and worthless idols. Jesus died for me. He has forgiven all my sins. He has purified me by his blood and he has defeated sin, death and

all the malign powers of darkness. Why would I put my faith in salt, stomping and sobbing babies and spurn such a great salvation?

It is certainly true that having rejected sumo wrestling I could become a rich, pampered professional football-



er but the beautiful game also throws down the gauntlet to a follower of Jesus. Truth be told I am too old and porcine for the Premier League. Without doubt I lack skill, spatial awareness and fitness. I am also cognisant of the stark spiritual realities; I would be confronted by a different set of gods - the Unholy Trinity - Money, Sex and Power. A story to ponder.

n 2008 Marlon King, a professional footballer, was relaxing in a fashionable nightclub in Soho, London. Overwhelmed by carnal cravings, he began touching a young woman inappropriately. King, a Wigan Athletic striker at the time, was disappointed and irate when the young 20 year-old student resisted his salacious advances. He spoke to the woman forcefully: "Don't you know who I am? I'm a millionaire. You're not even in my league." When she pushed him away, he punched her, leaving her with a broken nose, split lip and

blood pouring down her dress. As security staff intervened and led him away, the player allegedly remarked: "Why? I've done nothing wrong."

In my view Marlon King is enslaved to false gods as much as the sumo wrestlers but his gods are far more subtle, deceptive and popular than the kami. So which are worse? The Japanese Shinto gods or the secular gods of the western world?

To be honest I am not sure but as a Christian I am zealous to avoid the worship of all false gods and idols whether secular, Shinto, or pagan (I John 5.21). Following and serving false gods will not only ruin my life now but ruin my life in the age to come.

So richly blessed. This was just one conference!


What a blessing and challenge to be part of a relatively small team with such a BIG impact on work across Europe and further East.

Clare King describes the work of Rooted, who meet weekly in the Green House at Headingley, and encourages all of us to get involved in this vital ministry.

ach Tuesday evening the Green House door is opened to welcome a group of men and women who find themselves on the edge of society. They come with their varied problems, many of which originate from a dysfunctional family life. The name "Rooted" evolved over several years as we developed good relationships and began to understand that the solution to these many and varied problems was the need to be firmly planted in a good society but, more importantly, to be "rooted" in Christ.

We never know who will turn up. There are a few "regulars" who we worry about if they are missing but people generally come and go over the weeks depending on their needs and, probably, whether there is a better offer somewhere else! Recently the numbers have been more unpredictable with a definite link being found between folk who are now connected with Badminton (at South Parade on Monday evenings) and The Lighthouse (a ministry of St George's in the city centre).

Help preparing food for Rooted would be appreciated. We are looking for apprentices to join the team and work with us!

As an army marches on its stomach so the success of Rooted is based on its food. This is prepared by various people. One person regularly books the kitchen at South Parade, employs the skills and willingness of friends, and prepares vast quantities of food all portioned into an evenings'-worth, labelled and frozen ready for use. Amazing! Thank you Church for the facilities, skills, time, care and support you provide behind the scenes. The food is always very much appreciated. Postcard from Austria



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Dear friends, I hope you're well.

Instead of sending a "postcard" of Linz, Austria - where I am currently living and working with student ministry - here's a picture of Schloss Klaus. This is a castle among the mountains in central Austria. It's far prettier than Linz! I also stayed there on three different occasions during April.

Firstly, I was there for an international churches youth weekend. We remembered the Return of the King, as we looked at 2 Peter together – we encouraged and were encouraged to "be on your guard" from the error of false teaching; and to "grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord" (2 Peter 3.17-18), in the light of knowing that Jesus will return.

A week later, I was back there for Forum 2019, the national conference organised by the ÖSM: Christians at Uni movement across Austria. The conference helps to encourage and equip students for mission at their universities. Highlights of this time included: seeing students from across Austria grow in motivation for mission; spending time with a couple of international

unbelieving students, from playing table tennis to discussing Acts 17.16-34 together; and enjoying leading a seminar on "using questions in evangelism" in German, despite being a bit apprehensive about this beforehand.

My third trip to Schloss Klaus was for a "Langham Austria" national conference. This conference helps to train people to teach from the Bible relevantly, clearly and faithfully. It is only the fourth time that this conference has taken place. This is still fairly ground-breaking for Austria, as it helps under God - to develop Bible teaching here. Personally, I appreciated it as a

time to meet with Christ in Scripture again - particularly with the supreme and sufficient Christ of Colossians - as guest speaker Andrew Page pointed us to Christ through sermons on this letter.

Life in Linz ticks along, and presents the opportunity to live out what we learned, experienced and prayed at these times away.

The 5 Habits of Deeply Contented People by Andrew Page

This book is written for people looking for contentment.

Basing what he writes on the second chapter of the Bible, Andrew Page invites readers to experience a deeper level of




contentment through habits which express the image of God in us.

This is a short book – divided up in to bite-size parts. The emphasis is on living out the habits and being more contented, rather than spending lots of time on the theory.

It is accessible to unbelievers, as the author writes with the conviction that everyone is made in the image of God, and so the habits are relevant to all people. I appreciate this inclusiveness, but also the fact that the author points readers to Jesus and a relationship with him in the later parts of the book.

With "Something to do" application questions throughout, and an appendix of discussion questions for the different habits, this resource (along with a Bible) is well geared for use in small groups, two friends meeting up to talk through the habits together, or a mentoring/ discipleship relationship.

The Prodigal God: Recovering the Heart of the Christian Faith by Tim Keller

he first time I shared the story of the prodigal son with a Japanese friend I asked him, "So, what do you think?" He paused and reflected for a moment before responding, "Yes. I agree with the older brother." I didn't know how to respond at the time. I mean, we're not meant to relate to the older brother! The story isn't even about him: it's about the younger brother, the prodigal son.

Except of course that it's not. The story Jesus tells in Luke chapter 15 is about two sons, or rather it's about a father who goes out to both of his children - each lost in their own way - to call them home.

It's been quite a few years since my friend expressed his approval of the older son's confused and angry outburst at the father's forgiveness. I've since spoken with many other Japanese people who likewise value hard work, filial piety, faithfulness... and yet who desperately need God's grace.

Over that time I've become increasingly convinced that if we are to share the gospel with Japanese people in a way that is clear and compelling to them, then we need to understand the fullness of the gospel as contained in this famous, but often misunderstood, parable of Jesus.

So I recommend this book to you. Because although Keller doesn't explicitly set out to give guidance on how to explain the good news to Japanese people, that's one of the things this book does brilliantly, as Keller, with his trademark warmth, winsomeness, and wit, unpacks what the gospel means for those who are like the older brother.

"The elder brother is not losing the father's love in spite of his goodness, but because of it. It is not his sins that create the barrier between him and his father, it's the pride he has in his moral record; it's not his wrongdoing but his righteousness that is keeping him from sharing in the feast of the father."




Ford's Focus

John's Gospel Part 24: The Eternal Voice

John 20

ow that we are entering the closing chapters of our journey through John's gospel, I want to remind you of how we started this jaunt more than 3 years ago. A lot of my observations and insights of John's gospel have been to focus on Jesus and what we do with him, how we interact with him and ultimately how we walk with him.

We started off with an observation that John the Baptist's whole purpose in life was to point Jesus out in



a crowd and that he was also willing to lose disciples in order that they could "go and tell" others that they had seen the Christ. We saw Mary point people to Jesus when the wine had run out in John 2, and we saw Nicodemus realising that Jesus was more than just a man and seeking him at night in John 3, and so I could go on.

As we enter into John 20 we have a story where Mary Magdalene has "come to see" and is told to "go and tell" in order that more can "come and see".

Let's set the scene. We are at the tomb early in the morning when it is still dark, this tells us that we are before 6am. The tomb is in a garden and we find the sealing stone rolled away and the tomb empty.

We are told in other gospel accounts of the resurrection that Mary did not come alone. Why John only records that Mary came is unclear. What we do know is that she is surprised to see an empty tomb. Her first instinct is to go and tell the disciples that all is not as she had expected. It would appear that her first thought is that the governing body, the Romans or the Jewish leaders, have taken the body away and it appears that she is quite distraught. There seems to be an urgency and Peter and John run to the tomb and find it to be true, but I am guessing are rather confused.

n our next scene (John 20.14-15) we have Mary turning around and as she turns she sees someone she presumes to be the gardener. He asks her why she is weeping and who she is looking for. This person then speaks her name, "Mary", and she immediately identifies him by his voice as Jesus, the Voice in the garden.

I am reminded that this Voice in the garden has spoken before in another garden. At the outset of creation in Genesis 3.8-9 we read that "the man and his wife heard the voice (KJV) or sound (NLT) of the Lord God walking in the garden... and they hid themselves".

John, at the beginning of his gospel,

identifies the spoken word of God, Yahweh (who will be - who is - who was) as becoming flesh and dwelling amongst us. There is much that we could say about this act of God com-

ing down and dwelling in our midst. Suffice to say that a significant part of the Jewish story is all about a belief that God would come down and rescue His people. One of the first references to this is in Exodus 3.7-8 where God speaks with Moses and says:

- I have seen their misery
- I have heard their cry
- I am aware of their sufferings
- I have come down to rescue them in order to bring them up to a new land.

ohn's gospel is all about this Voice that has become flesh, that has come down in order to give new life. He culminates his account of Jesus in a garden gently speaking a name just as he did to Adam and Eve. It is this same Voice that was calling Adam and Eve to Himself in order that there could be restoration and regeneration, together with a realignment of all that was wrong as a result of their actions.

The same applies today as then. The eternal voice of the Spirit cries out calling us all by name in order to restore us to God Himself so that we have a story to tell and a voice that can "go and tell" and can compel others "to come and see".

I am guessing that Mary left that garden a different person. She went with enthusiasm and excitement and told the other disciples, "I have seen the Lord".

I wonder what our testimony is? Is it that I have seen the Lord? Is it that we have heard the eternal cry, Adam - Where are you? Or, like Mary have we just heard the gentle voice that speaks our name?

he word that John refers to at the beginning of his gospel account has become flesh, it has come down, it does dwell amongst us, it has risen, it has ascended and is glorified in order that all humanity past, present and future can enter into a relationship that will impact our lives for ever, and all we can say is Praise the Lord (Praise be to Yahweh). He will be, He is being, He was. HALLELUJAH!


